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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

CORRECTIONAL POPULATION PROJECTIONS:

- By 2018 there will be an estimated 2,910 inmates on average each day in Davidson County correctional facilities. This is a 7.6% decrease below 2013 population levels, and a 1.5% average decrease per year. Assuming current capacity levels, the correctional system will be operating at an estimated 68.5% capacity in 2018 (*pages 17, 28*).
- Male inmates are projected to decline 1.8% each year through 2018, to reach a projected daily population of 2,482. Female inmates are projected to decline 0.1% annually, to 428 per day. Juvenile inmates are estimated to hold steady at an estimated 10 inmates per day in 2018 (*pages 18-20, 25*).
- By 2018 there will be an estimated 946 locally sentenced felons in the average daily jail population, a 1.8% annual decline. Pretrial felons will decline 0.02% on average each year to 929. Overall, all charge classes are projected to decline through the projection period except misdemeanor probation violators (*page 21-24*).
- Female pretrial felons are projected to grow 3.6% annually through 2018. Female inmates in four other charge classes are also expected to increase. However, misdemeanor probation violators are the only class projected to increase for males (*page 25*).

DAVIDSON COUNTY POPULATION:

- Davidson County's population grew an average 1% per year from 2000-2013. The population was estimated to be 648,447 in 2013, and is projected to steadily grow 1.0% per year through 2018, reaching 681,193 Davidson County residents.
- The portion of the population most at risk for arrest, ages 18-45, is expected to grow 0.5% per year during this period. The 15-17 portion of the population is increasing at a higher rate than that of the 18-45 age range, a 1% average annual increase with males at an average 0.8% and females at an average annual increase of 1.2% (*pages 4-5, 26*).

REPORTED CRIME:

- Reported crime in Davidson County decreased 6.1% in 2013 compared to 2012. Violent crimes decreased 9.0% while property crimes decreased 5.2%. Overall, reported crime has been declining in Davidson County since 2001 (*pages 6, 27*).

ARRESTS:

- In 2013 there were 40,097 adult physical arrests in Davidson County, a 6.3% decrease from 2012. The number of State Citations issued in 2013 increased 1.9% over 2012, to 46,189 (*page 7*).


ADMISSIONS AND RELEASES:

- In 2013 admissions to Davidson County correctional facilities decreased 6.3% below 2012 levels. Admissions have only decreased 3 times since the year 2000; the most recent previous decline was in 2010. The average length of stay for inmates increased from 25.5 days to 26.4 days in 2013 (*page 12*).
- Releases from Davidson County correctional facilities decreased 5.8% in 2013. Bond releases were down 6.8% and releases to the Pretrial Release program declined 11.2%. In 2013 most inmates were released after bonding out, completing their sentence, or transferring to another authority (*pages 12-13, 16*).

AVERAGE DAILY CORRECTIONAL POPULATION:

- The average daily correctional population was 3,151 in 2013 which was 6.3% less than in 2012 when the population averaged 3,362. The year 2013 was the fifth straight year of ADP declines (*pages 9-12*).
- Davidson County correctional facilities operated at 74% of capacity in 2013, which was a decrease from 2012 when the capacity was 79% (*page 8*).
- On an average day in 2013, the largest group of inmates in the correctional population was black males, 21-30 years old. The largest percentage of inmate charge classification was locally sentenced felons at 33%. The second largest charge classification was pretrial felons at 29.5% (*page 14*).
- In 2013 more than half (55.9%) of all inmates in the daily correctional population were charged with a nonviolent crime as their most serious arrested charge. The largest category was Crimes Against the Courts and Government, which accounted for 26.7% of all inmates. Violent crimes were the primary charge for 27.6% of the population, a 6.2% decline from 2012. Aggravated Assaults, 6.7% of inmates, was the largest group in the violent crime category. Drug offenses accounted for 16.6% of inmates in 2013 (*page 15*).



2000-2018**











2009-2018**



2009-2018**



2009-2018**












2013 – 2018**




