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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

CORRECTIONAL POPULATION PROJECTIONS:

- By 2019 there will be an estimated 2,330 inmates on average each day in Davidson County correctional facilities. This is a 18.7% decrease below 2014 population levels, and a 4.1% average decrease per year. Assuming current capacity levels, the correctional system will be operating at an estimated 54.8% capacity in 2019 (*pages 16, 27*).
- Male inmates are projected to decline 3.7% each year through 2019, to reach a projected daily population of 2,049. Female inmates are projected to decline 6.3% annually, to 281 per day. Juvenile inmates are estimated to steadily decline to an estimated 0 inmates per day in 2019 (*pages 17-19, 24*).
- By 2019 there will be an estimated 729 locally sentenced felons in the average daily jail population, a 5% annual decline. Pretrial felons will decline 4.1% on average each year to 730. Overall, all charge classes are projected to decline through the projection period except felony and misdemeanor probation violators and state sentenced felons (*page 20-23*).
- Female pretrial felons are projected to decline 5.5% annually through 2019. Female inmates in all other charge classes are also expected to decrease with the exception of misdemeanor probation violators, state sentenced felons and pretrial misdemeanants which are expected to increase. Misdemeanor probation violators, state sentenced felons and felony probation violators are projected to increase for males (*page 24*).

DAVIDSON COUNTY POPULATION:

- Davidson County's population grew an average 1.33% per year from 2005-2014. The population was estimated to be 664,327 in 2014, and is projected to steadily grow 1.2% per year through 2019, reaching 696,112 Davidson County residents.
- The portion of the population most at risk for arrest, ages 18-45, is expected to grow 0.9% per year during this period. The 15-17 portion of the population is expected to grow an average of 0.6% annually with males at an average of 0.4% and females at an average annual increase of 0.9% (*pages 4-5, 25*).

REPORTED CRIME:

- Reported crime in Davidson County decreased 2.0% in 2014 compared to 2013. Violent crimes increased 6.6% while property crimes decreased 4.4%. Overall, reported crime has been declining in Davidson County since 2005 (*pages 6, 26*).

ARRESTS:

- In 2014 there were 39,726 adult physical arrests in Davidson County, a 0.9% decrease from 2013. The number of State Citations issued in 2014 decreased 6.5% over 2013, to 43,275 (*page 7*).


ADMISSIONS AND RELEASES:

- In 2014 admissions to Davidson County correctional facilities decreased 5.1% below 2013 levels. Admissions have only decreased 3 times since the year 2005; the most recent previous decline was in 2013. The average length of stay for inmates decreased from 26.4 days to 24.4 days in 2014 (*page 11*).
- Releases from Davidson County correctional facilities decreased 4.9% in 2014. Bond releases have increased 0.4% and releases to the Pretrial Release program declined 12.7% in 2014 most inmates were released after bonding out, completing their sentence, or transferring to another authority (*pages 11-12, 15*).

AVERAGE DAILY CORRECTIONAL POPULATION:

- The average daily correctional population was 2,867 in 2014 which was 9.0% less than in 2013 when the population averaged 3,151. The year 2014 was the sixth straight year of ADP declines (*pages 8-10*).
- Davidson County correctional facilities operated at 68% of capacity in 2014, which was a decrease from 2013 when the capacity was 74% (*page 8*).
- On an average day in 2014, the largest group of inmates in the correctional population was black males, 21-30 years old. The largest percentage of inmate charge classification was locally sentenced felons at 32.9%. The second largest charge classification was pretrial felons at 31.5% (*page 13*).
- In 2014 more than half (53.7%) of all inmates in the daily correctional population were charged with a nonviolent crime as their most serious arrested charge. The largest category was Crimes Against the Courts and Government, which accounted for 25.9% of all inmates. Violent crimes were the primary charge for 30.7% of the population, a 2.4% increase from 2013. Aggravated Assault, 8.5% of inmates, was the largest group in the violent crime category. Drug offenses accounted for 15.6% of inmates in 2014 (*page 14*).



2005 - 2019**







FOR 2014**







2010 - 2019**





MALE INMATES



2010 - 2019**










2010 – 2019**






2010 – 2019**




