

**1 ST. CECILIA MOTHERHOUSE**



Motherhouse of Dominican Sisters, the Congregation of St. Cecilia was founded in 1860 to establish an academy for the higher education of young women in Nashville; the Sisters witnessed the Battle of Nashville from this vantage point on a hill just north of downtown Nashville.


**2 FISK UNIVERSITY CAMPUS**



Founded in 1866 as Fisk Free Colored School to offer education as a means of building better lives for former slaves. Jubilee Hall was built with funds raised by the Jubilee Singers and houses the painting of the Singers commissioned by Queen Victoria.

Fisk University is an active college campus; the grounds are open to visitors. Jubilee Hall is a residence hall and is not open to the public.


**3 TENNESSEE STATE CAPITOL**



Headquarters of the military government headed by Andrew Johnson after the occupation of the city; grounds include memorials to Sam Davis and Andrew Johnson.

**4 ST. MARY'S OF THE SEVEN SORROWS CATHOLIC CHURCH**



The oldest remaining church building in Nashville; it was used as a military hospital during the war. It was designed in the 1840's by Prussian-born Adolphus Heiman, who died in 1862 while a colonel in the Confederate Army.

**5 TENNESSEE STATE MUSEUM**



Home of one of the finest collections of Civil War artifacts in the state.

**6 WOMEN OF THE CONFEDERACY MONUMENT**



Located outside the courtyard of the War Memorial Building, this statue designed by Tennessee sculptor Belle Kinney was erected in 1926 to honor the sacrifice of women during the Civil War.

**7 DOWNTOWN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH**



Site of First Presbyterian Church; designed by William Strickland, it is considered to be the best example of Egyptian Revival architecture in the U.S. It was used as Union Hospital #8 during the Civil War.

**8 CHURCH OF THE HOLY TRINITY**



Beautiful Gothic structure used by Union forces as a powder magazine and horse stable during occupation.


**9 LINDSLEY HALL**



Home of the Western Military Institute; this building was designed by Adolphus Heiman and located on what was the campus of the University of Nashville. It served as Union Hospital #2 during the Civil War.


**10 NASHVILLE NATIONAL CEMETERY**



Final resting place for more than 15,000 Union soldiers, including almost 1,500 United States Colored Troops.

Plantation home of Dr. James Hoggatt, where John McClane was enslaved until he ran away with the Union Army.

**12 MT. OLIVET CEMETERY CONFEDERATE CIRCLE**



Burial site of seven Confederate generals and some 1,500 Confederate soldiers; site of a 45-foot tall monument erected in 1889 by the United Daughters of the Confederacy.


**13 NASHVILLE CITY CEMETERY**



Nashville's oldest public cemetery and final resting place of many notables, including Capt. William Driver and three Confederate generals; it served as a temporary burial ground immediately after the Battle of Nashville.

**14 FORT NEGLEY**



The largest fortification built by the occupying Union Army in Nashville, and the largest inland stone fort constructed during the Civil War.

**15 THE LAND TRUST FOR TENNESSEE'S GLEN LEVEN FARM**




Home of the Thompson family; it served as Union Army field hospital during the Battle of Nashville, and is the largest piece of the battlefield still intact.

**16 TRAVELLERS REST PLANTATION**




Home of John and Harriet Overton and headquarters of Confederate General John Bell Hood during the Battle of Nashville.


**DAVIDSON COUNTY**

**17 STEWART'S WALL**



Confederate position held until the second day of the Battle of Nashville when Union forces broke the line.


**19 BELMONT MANSION**



Home of Adelia Acklen just outside the city limits in 1864; it was the headquarters of Union General T. J. Wood during the battle.


**21 BATTLE OF NASHVILLE PEACE MONUMENT**



Memorial to honor the sacrifices of Confederate and Union soldiers at the Battle of Nashville as well as those who served in World War I; it was dedicated on Armistice Day 1927.


**22 REDOUBT NO. 1**



One of five small forts built along the west flank of Confederate line prior to the Battle of Nashville; it was the last of the forts to fall on the first day of the battle.

**23 BELLE MEADE MANSION**



Plantation home of General William Gile and Elizabeth McGavock Harding; it was headquarters for Confederate General Chalmers of Forrest's command prior to the Battle of Nashville December 1864.

**24 KELLEY'S POINT**



Site of battle between Union "brown water" Navy and Confederate Cavalry that occurred between the Battles of Franklin and Nashville; located in Bell's Bend of the Cumberland River, west of Nashville.
