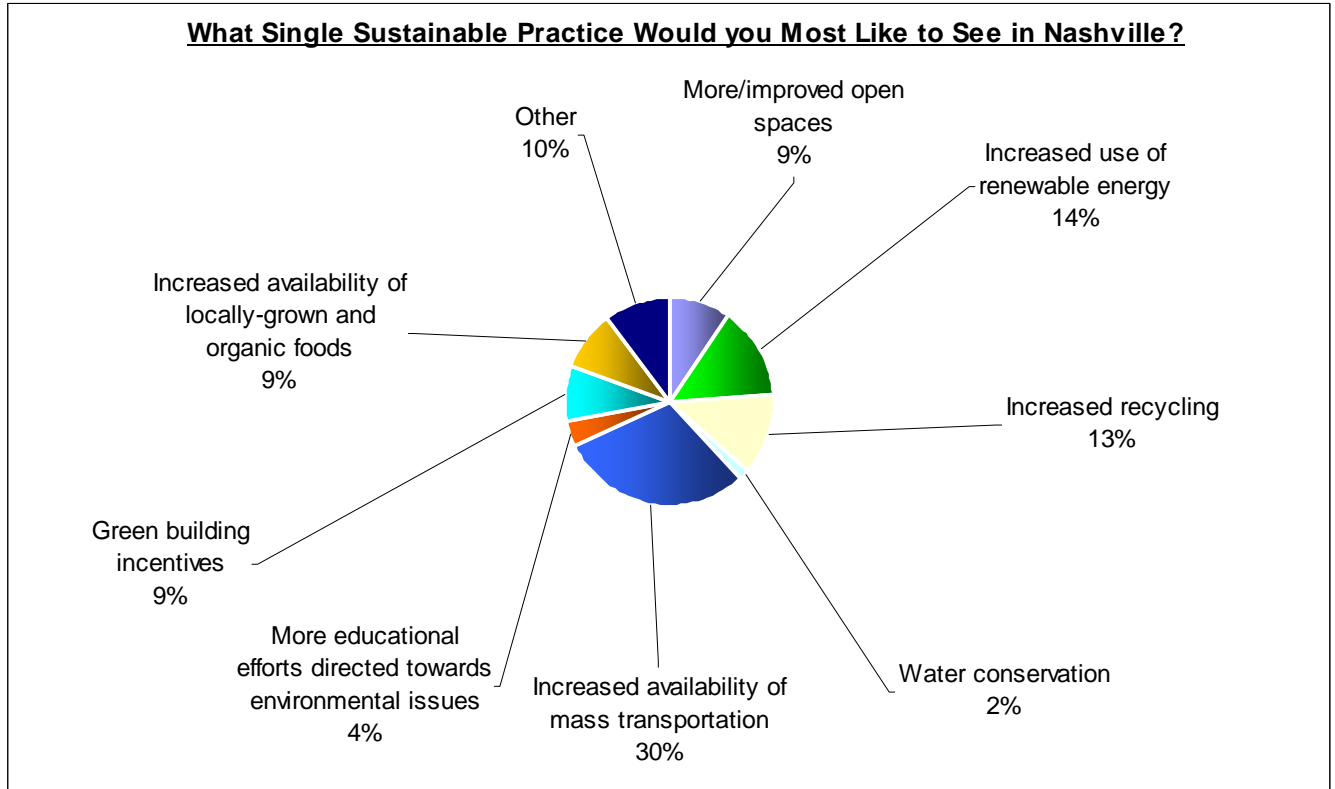


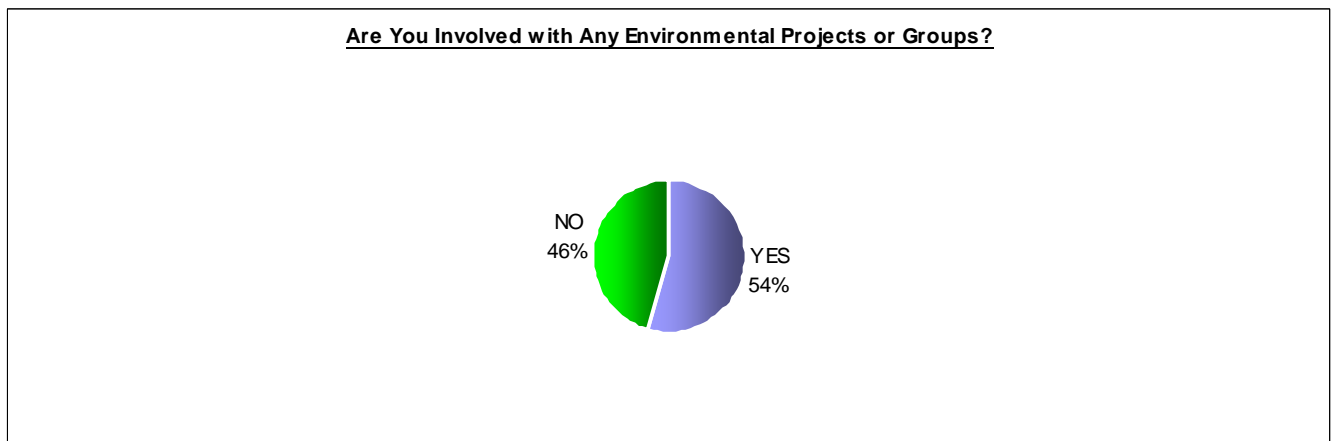
Green Ribbon Survey Highlights

On June 19th, the Mayor's Office gave citizens the opportunity to send their input and comments to the Green Ribbon Committee via a survey on nashville.gov. By December, when the survey ended, 1,824 people had responded providing their opinions on what would make Nashville more sustainable and what they, as citizens, were willing to do to support a more sustainable Nashville.

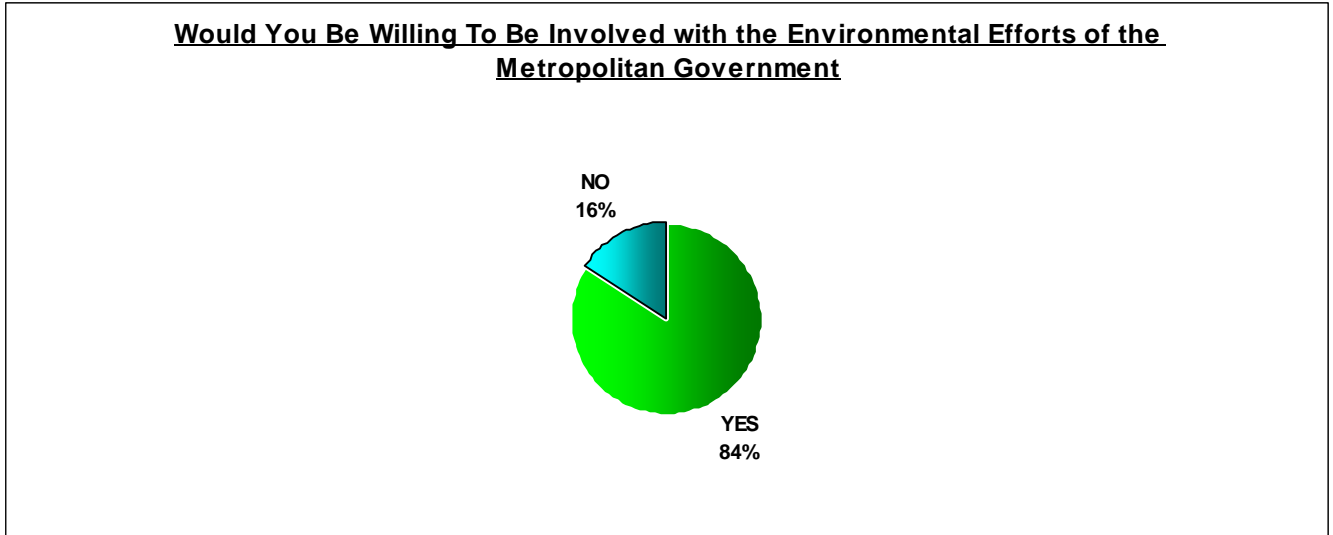
Survey participants were asked what single sustainable practice they would like to see in Nashville. By far, at 30% most participants want increased availability of mass transportation. That is followed by increased renewable energy and increased recycling.



54% of those who responded to the survey are involved in some environmental group or activity.



Interesting to note that while 54% are involved in some activity, the vast majority of respondents, 84% want to be involved in the future. This indicates a commitment on the part of those who responded in supporting environmental efforts in Nashville.



On a more personal level, respondents indicated what activities they were willing to do to help protect the environment. Recycling, not littering and using energy saving light bulbs were the most popular, with activities that had potential high costs associated such as driving a fuel efficient vehicle, upgrading appliances or making ones home more energy efficient coming in last.
