Commander Carlos Lara began his career with the Metropolitan Nashville Police Department in 2008. His assignments included serving as a Patrol officer, Flex Unit officer, El Protector Program officer, Case Prep Unit officer, Crime Suppression Unit detective, and Gang Unit detective. After promotion to Sergeant in 2014, he was assigned to the Central Precinct midnight shift and then to the Office of Professional Accountability where he investigated complaints against Department personnel. With a promotion to Lieutenant in 2016, he would serve as the South Precinct midnight shift detail Commander.
