




Tennessee State Capitol Building

The Tennessee State Capitol building, a National Historic Landmark, was designed by renowned architect William Strickland and constructed over a period of 14 years, beginning in 1845 and completed in 1859. The Greek-Revival style building is notable from an engineering standpoint because of its unusually extensive (for the time) use of stone, as well as being one of the first buildings to use structural iron instead of wood for roof supports to reduce the risk of fire. It is also one of just eleven U.S. state capitol buildings without a dome. President James K. Polk, a native Tennessean, and his wife are entombed on the grounds.
