The Place, The Programs, The People

Warner Park Nature Center staff have experienced many challenges - from floods, lightning strikes, budget cuts, vandalism and more - but nothing preceded the COVID-19 pandemic to assist us in navigating 2020.

Despite a 7-week stay at home order, re-opening (and closing) with new safety protocols and constantly shifting program procedures, the naturalists, support staff, interns and volunteers remained engaged throughout the year. This amazing group never lost their passion and enthusiasm for our mission and continued to provide high quality educational programming and outstanding visitor services while maintaining the natural and physical features of the nature center campus.

And through it all, we learned the Nature Center and Warner Parks were essential places of respite and restoration for so many visitors. We celebrate the creativity and energy of our staff as we share the successes of this year.

The Place

Warner Parks and the Nature Center campus saw unprecedented use in 2020, providing a much-needed sanctuary and respite for visitors.

Several improvements and additions were successfully competed on site, and the facilities and grounds were well maintained all year.





Completed renovation of the Milbrey Warner Waller Library and dedicated the **Sandy Bivens BIRD Education Center.**

Installed the **improved native landscaping and water feature** and dedicated the Sandy Bivens BIRD Garden.

Installed and activated **the MOTUS receiver station**, the first dual-frequency station in Tennessee.

Added **cedar swings and adirondack chairs** for informal gatherings, reflection and family time.

Eagle Scouts completed 6 projects including a Decomposer Education Station, two Invasive Plant Removal sessions, a dozen new Barricades and a Golf Cart Storage Shed.

Re-opened **the Learning Center museum** to the public following safety protocols.

Enhanced and maintained the organic garden, fern & wildflower gardens, teaching ponds, bird blind, storywalk trail and nature play areas for visitors to enjoy year-round on their own.



Find Your Inner Naturalist (FYI) adult learning series provided 9 engaging presentations led in-person and virtually by regional experts.

Special events went virtual and engaged thousands of patrons with livestream and post-recorded videos during the Spring City Nature Challenge, TN Star Party and Hummingbird Celebration.

School field trips and labs reached 525 students through in-person explorations (Jan-Mar) and engaged 1,500 through 20 online videos and curriculum (Aug-Dec)

Family and youth programs reached more than 5,000 patrons through safe, in-person hikes, on-your-own iSpy and exploration kit activities, monthly Nature Club meetings and 8 virtual nature webinars.

Community Center youth engaged in after-school (Jan-Mar) and weekend (Sept-Dec) family nature explorations.

More than 160,000 patrons engaged through social and digital media content including the e-newsletter, new Nuthatch Notes blog and 34 educational YouTube videos.

The Programs

Educational programs are at the center of our mission, and the year began with a robust calendar of public events, school field trips and summer enrichment activities.


