Davidson County is *Veteran Friendly*, but not necessarily *Veteran-Ready*.




- Service Ecosystem focuses on Veterans in crisis
- Isolated examples of *Veteran-Ready* initiatives
- Unawareness of Veterans' economic, employment and volunteer impact
- Lack of oversight and coordination to leverage Veteran impact
- Veteran talent is under-recruited, under-retained and under-utilized

Assessment # 2

A robust but uncoordinated crisis service ecosystem.




- Lack of city leadership commitment to end Veteran homelessness...reach "functional zero"
- Coordination difficulties defining and attaining common goals
- Close to 40% not enrolled with VA to receive benefits or healthcare
- Current housing capacity does not meet Veteran vouchers issued
- Lack of adequate affordable housing affects recruitment and retention of workforce Veterans


Why Metro?
