





## Site Research




### 1810




The community of Antioch was established in 1810 with First Baptist Church located near Mill Creek. Above is a similar church north of the area. Churches during this time acted as schools, voting centers, and town halls.

### 1871



This 1871 county map shows the location of Antioch Church, the Tusculum Road, and the Chattanooga railroad that connect to Nashville and Murfreesboro to the southwest. The star on the map shows the location of the site, which is northwest of Whittemore Branch.

## 1934



This 1934 county map shows the location of the Antioch Church, the Oneyville Post Office, and the names of several landowners in the area. It also shows Tusculum Road, which was named for the nearby home of Judge John Haywood.

### 1947

James McLendon, the former property owner, shared that his parents purchased 36 acres of land, including the 9.55 acres that constitutes the Tusculum Road Park, in 1947. The family lived on the property for years before moving off site and renting out the home.

### 2006

Following the destruction of the home by a fire, the property was divided into three parcels with the intent to develop it. One of the plans included an RV park - RV hookups are still on site today!


### 2021

Metro Parks approached the McLendon family to discuss the purchase of the site. At the time, the property was zoned to allow for the construction of approximately 44 houses on the site. James and his wife, Edith, chose to sell to Metro Parks in order to preserve the many large trees and the natural beauty of the site.


## **Community Profile**









Through community spaces, stewardship and education, we promote the natural, cultural and creative character of our community.


