


- 18 people moved into permanent housing in February with Housing Choice Vouchers- the most since March 2022.

- Less than 1% of clients in Street Outreach programs exited to permanent housing in February.




## **Housing Exits by Destination**

### Street Outreach




Street Outreach (SO) projects offer services necessary to reach out to people experiencing unsheltered homelessness, connect them to emergency shelters, housing, or other services, and provide urgent non-facilitybased care to people unwilling or unable to access emergency shelter or other housing.

#### HMIS-Participating SO providers:



- 17 agencies provided Street Outreach services to 2,122 clients (2,035 households) in February.
- 18 clients (0.8%) exited Street Outreach programs to permanent housing destinations in February.
- 2,707 unique clients have been served by Street Outreach projects since March 2022.
- The completeness of this data has fluctuated based on agency participation.

- # of People Per Month Exiting SO Programs to permanent destinations


## **Emergency Shelters**

Emergency Shelter (ES) projects offer temporary shelter/lodging for people experiencing homelessness in general or specific populations of people experiencing homelessness.

#### **HMIS-Participating ES Providers:**



- 8 agencies provided Emergency Shelter bed services to 492 clients (363 households) in February.
- 23 clients (4.7%) exited Emergency Shelter programs to positive housing destinations in February.
- 1,714 unique clients have been served by Emergency Shelter projects since March 2022.

# **Transitional Housing**




**Transitional Housing (TH)** projects provide individuals and families experiencing homelessness with the interim stability and support needed to successfully move to and maintain permanent housing.

#### **HMIS-Participating TH Providers:**



- 7 agencies provided Transitional Housing services to 209 clients (186 households) in February . This data does not include the Nashville Rescue Mission.
- 12 clients (5.7%) exited Transitional Housing programs to positive housing destinations in February.
- 505 unique clients have been served by Transitional Housing programs since March 2022.


# **Rapid Rehousing**

**Rapid Rehousing (RRH)** projects fund short-or medium-term rental assistance and housing relocation/stabilization services designed to quickly move individuals and families from emergency shelters or places not meant for habitation into permanent housing.

#### HMIS-Participating RRH Providers:

- 10 agencies provided Rapid Rehousing services to 1,496 clients (704 households) in February.
- 859 of those people (429 households) have moved into housing so far.
- 67 clients exited Rapid Rehousing programs to positive housing destinations in February.
- 6 clients exited Rapid Rehousing programs to homelessness, institutions, or death in February.
- 2,482 unique clients have been served by Rapid Rehousing programs since March 2022.

# **Permanent Housing**




Permanent Housing (PH) projects are community-based housing without a designated length of stay in which formerly homeless individuals and families live as independently as possible. Under PH, a program participant must be the tenant on a lease for an initial term that is renewable. Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) projects are projects that offer permanent housing and supportive services to assist homeless persons with a disability to live independently.


## **Homelessness Prevention**
