


2,108 people experiencing homelessness were housed in Nashville from August 2021 through July 2022.


- Exits to permanent housing destinations from Emergency Shelters*, Transitional Housing,

- Other exits to permanent housing documented in **Coordinated Entry (CE)** and **Domestic Violence Coordinated Entry (DV CE)****.



Street Outreach



Street Outreach (SO) projects offer services necessary to reach out to people experiencing unsheltered homelessness, connects them to emergency shelters, housing, or other services, and provides urgent non-facility-based care to people unwilling or unable to access emergency shelter or other housing.



- 15 agencies provided Street Outreach services to 1,693 clients (1,624 households) in July.
- 47 clients exited Street Outreach programs to permanent housing destinations in July.
- 2,321 unique clients have been served by Street Outreach projects since August 2021.
- The completeness of this data has fluctuated based on agency participation.

- → # of People Per Month Exiting SO Programs to permanent destinations


Emergency Shelters

Emergency Shelter (ES) projects offer temporary shelter/lodging for people experiencing homelessness in general or specific populations of people experiencing homelessness.

- 8 agencies provided Emergency Shelter bed services to 211 clients (158 households) in July.
- 6 clients exited Emergency Shelter programs to positive housing destinations in July.
- 1,129 unique clients have been served by Emergency Shelter projects since August 2021.

Transitional Housing




Transitional Housing (TH) projects provide individuals and families experiencing homelessness with the interim stability and support needed to successfully move to and maintain permanent housing.

- 6 agencies provided Transitional Housing services to 218 clients (178 households) in July. This data does not include the Nashville Rescue Mission.
- 15 clients exited Transitional Housing programs to positive housing destinations in July.
- 471 unique clients have been served by Transitional Housing programs since August 2021.

Rapid Rehousing

Rapid Rehousing (RRH) projects fund short-or medium-term rental assistance and housing relocation/stabilization services designed to quickly move individuals and families from emergency shelters or places not meant for habitation into permanent housing.



- 11 agencies provided Rapid Rehousing services to 1,453 clients (736 households) in July.
- 890 of those people (426 households) have moved into housing so far.
- 61 clients exited Rapid Rehousing programs to positive housing destinations in July.
- 2,218 unique clients have been served by Rapid Rehousing programs since August 2021.

Permanent Housing




Permanent Housing (PH) projects are community-based housing without a designated length of stay in which formerly homeless individuals and families live as independently as possible. Under PH, a program participant must be the tenant on a lease for an initial term that is renewable. Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) projects are projects that offer permanent housing and supportive services to assist homeless persons with a disability to live independently.

- 1 clients exited Permanent Housing programs to **positive housing destinations** in **July**.

- # of People Per Month Exiting PH programs to permanent destinations


Homelessness Prevention

Homelessness Prevention (HP) projects fund short-and/or medium-term rental assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services (financial assistance and service costs) designed to prevent an at-risk individual or family from moving into an emergency shelter or place not meant for habitation.

- 10 agencies provided Homelessness Prevention services to 241 clients (97 households) in July.
- 32 clients exited Homelessness Prevention programs to positive housing destinations in July.
- 673 unique clients have been served by HP programs since August 2021.
