


1,921 people experiencing homelessness were housed in Nashville from March 2021 through March 2022.

*This data does not include information from the Nashville Rescue Mission. **DV CE data only includes the heads of household's information, and may under-represent the number of people fleeing domestic violence who were housed.



Street Outreach



Street Outreach (SO) projects offer services necessary to reach out to people experiencing unsheltered homelessness, connects them to emergency shelters, housing, or other services, and provides urgent non-facility-based care to people unwilling or unable to access emergency shelter or other housing.



- 15 agencies provided Street Outreach services to 1,504 clients (1,482 households) in March.
- 27 clients exited Street Outreach programs to permanent housing destinations in March.
- 2,123 unique clients have been served by Street Outreach projects since March 1 2021.
- The completeness of this data has fluctuated based on agency participation.

-O- # of People Per Month Exiting SO Programs to permanent destinations


Emergency Shelters

Emergency Shelter (ES) projects offer temporary shelter/lodging for people experiencing homelessness in general or specific populations of people experiencing homelessness.

HMIS-Participating ES Providers:



- 8 agencies provided Emergency Shelter bed services to 380 clients (300 households) in March. This increase is in part due to Nashville's cold weather shelters.
- 40 clients exited Emergency Shelter programs to positive housing destinations in March.
- 1210 unique clients have been served by Emergency Shelter projects since March 1 2021.
- The completeness of the data has fluctuated based on agency participation. This data does not include the Nashville Rescue Mission. This data does not include complete records from Metro's Cold Weather Shelter.

Transitional Housing



Transitional Housing (TH) projects provide individuals and families experiencing homelessness with the interim stability and support needed to successfully move to and maintain permanent housing.

HMIS-Participating TH Providers:

- 6 agencies provided Transitional Housing services to 198 clients (169 households) in March. This data does not include the Nashville Rescue Mission.
- 21 clients exited Transitional Housing programs to **positive housing destinations** in March.
- 522 unique clients have been served by Transitional Housing programs since March 1 2021.

Rapid Rehousing

Rapid Rehousing (RRH) projects fund short-or medium-term rental assistance and housing relocation/stabilization services designed to quickly move individuals and families from emergency shelters or places not meant for habitation into permanent housing.



- 11 agencies provided Rapid Rehousing services to 1,179 clients (664 households) in March.
- 649 of those people (372 households) have moved into housing so far.
- 73 clients exited Rapid Rehousing programs to positive housing destinations in March.
- 2,108 unique clients have been served by Rapid Rehousing programs since February 1 2021.

Permanent Housing



Permanent Housing (PH) projects are community-based housing without a designated length of stay in which formerly homeless individuals and families live as independently as possible. Under PH, a program participant must be the tenant on a lease for an initial term that is renewable. Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) projects are projects that offer permanent housing and supportive services to assist homeless persons with a disability to live independently.

- 6 agencies provided Permanent Housing services to **1,857** clients (1,281 households) in March.
- *The month of May 2021 included a large-scale data clean-up effort for projects that no longer updated client information in HMIS.
- 0 clients exited Permanent Housing programs to positive housing destinations in March.
- 2,101 unique clients have been served by PH programs since March 1 2021.

Homelessness Prevention

Homelessness Prevention (HP) projects fund short-and/or medium-term rental assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services (financial assistance and service costs) designed to prevent an at-risk individual or family from moving into an emergency shelter or place not meant for habitation.


HMIS-Participating HP Providers:







- 9 agencies provided Homelessness Prevention services to 203 clients (102 households) in March.
- 32 clients exited Homelessness Prevention programs to positive housing destinations in March.
- 672 unique clients have been served by HP programs since February 1 2021.
