- ✓ Affordable Housing
- ✓ Appropriate Services
- ✓ Adequate Income



Homelessness in Nashville.



- 1,432 in sheltered situations (emergency shelters, transitional housing)
- 584 in unsheltered situations (street, encampments, cars, etc.)



Homelessness during COVID-19.



- Social Distancing at Nashville Rescue Mission.
- Metro shelters at Fairgrounds & Municipal Auditorium.
- Approx. half of population stays in encampments (compared to about 1/3 prior to COVID).

Early on during the COVID pandemic (April & May, 2020), shelter homelessness decreased, while outdoor homelessness increased. Encampment population increase since June 2020: an <u>estimated</u> 5%

Homelessness becomes increasingly visible.

- Service models changed.
- Libraries closed.
- Waiting rooms limited.
- Downtown encampments grow.
- Service needs increase immediately (food insecurity, showers, laundry, medical services, mental health services, etc.)

House 400+ people experiencing literal homelessness by December 2021.

- Landlord Incentives.
- Bi-weekly coordination calls.
