### What is the purpose or intent of the idea?

The East Thompson Community is a neighborhood choked by highways and high speed roads in every direction: Murfreesboro Pike, East Thompson Lane, Briley Parkway, and I-24 bound the neighborhood with dangerous, car-centric infrastructure. Neighbors have contended with a neighborhood designed for vehicles, begging for traffic calming for years and laughing at the idea of biking through the neighborhood. East Thompson Lane, the central, city-owned roadway through the heart of the neighborhood, is in Nashville?s High Injury Network. Now, neighborhood leaders are struggling to find ways to foster connection and community among neighbors who predominantly rely on personal vehicles even to get to parks, schools, the grocery store, and the neighborhood center. Nashville opened the first segment of Whitsett Park Greenway nearly 10 years ago, providing a cherished neighborhood asset that is not yet fully accessible to the full neighborhood. Extending the Whitsett Park Greenway throughout the neighborhood will provide a opportunity to physically reconnect a neighborhood split by dangerous roadways and bifurcated by the beautiful Mill Creek. Leveraging recently acquired land by Metro, the greenway can have a trailhead both on East Thompson Lane in the neighborhood center and off Currey Road / Southwood, providing access from every corner of the neighborhood to one of the community?s cherished public assets. The greenway extension will provide the opportunity for greater community connection and improve mobility for local residents to access community assets without relying on a personal vehicle. 10% of residents in this area do not have access to any vehicle.





### Please describe the public benefit:

The greenway extension will provide greater access to Mill Creek and the surrounding Metro-owned protected floodplain. The neighborhood cherishes the current one-mile greenway, filling it up on weekends and even many weekdays. The greenway is currently limited in access due to the surrounding car-centric infrastructure. Providing multiple access points across East Thompson Lane, Mill Creek, and Briley Parkway will reconnect the neighborhood and provide opportunities for a healthier neighborhood through physical, mental, and relational stimulation. It will also make public land more accessible to the neighborhood, part of which the Greater Nashville Regional Council classifies as a highly vulnerable area. With 25% of residents living at or below the poverty line in this area, public investment in more green space, safe transportation infrastructure, and community connection would be beneficial to improving the quality of life and facilitating greater opportunities for residents.

# **Proposed Markers:**

Bass Street Neighborhood: This was the city's first post-emancipation-free black neighborhood near and on the site of Fort Negley. There has been recent archaeological work by MTSU and Vanderbilt.

1303 Caldwell Avenue: Formerly the site of the house of Rev. Kelly Miller Smith, who was a key organizer during the Nashville Sit-ins. According to Martin Luther King, the Nashville sit-ins were the most organized movement in the south. During the funeral of John Lweis, Civil Rights advocate James Lawson spoke about how the Reverend's work made it possible for John Lewis and others to be part of the non-violent movement.

Rose Hill: a memorial to the Turnkey III home development between 1975-1977. The homes were built after residents organized in opposition Organized Neighbors of Edgehill ONE to a significant new housing development proposed for the South Street area. This marker would celebrate the successful partnership of metro public works with neighborhood activism.

12th Avenue South: Two sites of the former 12 South black businesses to be selected in partnership with the metropolitan historical commission. Hick's Grocery Store, Clemons' Drug Store, and Patton's Funeral Home are potential sites.
