



**2,651 people** experienced homelessness in Nashville in **October 2023**. These 2,651 people were in **2,058 households**; **188 families** and **1,870 adult only households**. Over the past 12 months, **7,329 unique people** have experienced homelessness in Nashville.




#### Number of people experiencing chronic homelessness over time






In October, **226** people experiencing homelessness were served in Emergency Shelters, **1,202** in Street Outreach, **215** in Transitional Housing, **515** in Supportive Services only, **and 526** in Rapid Re-Housing who had not yet been housed.




In **October, 52**% of people experiencing homelessness were Black, **39**% were White, **3**% were Hispanic/Latino, **5**% were Multiracial, and **1**% were other.



In **October**, **55**% of people experiencing homelessness were men, **44**% were women, **<1**% were non-binary, **1**% were transgender, and **<1**% were other.



In family households, **74%** of people are Black and **14%** are White.




In adult only households, **44%** of people are Black and **48%** are White.

## Nashville Housing Data, October 2023


**191 people** experiencing homelessness were housed in Nashville in **October 2023**. These 191 people were in **106 households**; **34 families** and **72 adult only households**. *Over the past 12 months*, **1,838 people** have been housed in Nashville.






Nashville housed 7% of the total people experiencing homelessness in October; 18% of the families and 4% of the adult only households.









**41** households were housed with rapid re-housing subsidies in October, followed by **24** households who were housed with no subsidy, and **11** households who were housed with **Housing Choice Vouchers**.




In **October, 30** people experiencing homelessness were housed from Emergency Shelters, **44** from Street Outreach, **23** from Transitional Housing, **14** from Supportive Services Only, and **111** from Rapid Re-Housing.




In **October**, **58%** of people housed were Black, **35%** were White, **<1%** were Hispanic/Latino, **6%** were Multiracial, and **<1%** were other.



In **October**, **49%** of people housed were men, **50%** were women, **0%** were non-binary, **1%** were transgender, and **0%** were other.



In family households, **68%** of people housed were Black and **23%** were White.



In adult only households, **42%** of people housed were Black and **54%** were White.

The Top 3 agencies who housed the most households in September were: **The Salvation Army (39), Operation Stand Down (21), and Oasis Center (12).**
