MDHA Request for Applications (RFA) Status

- Staff has executed 4 of the 5 developer agreements for the 1st round grantees.
- The agreement for UHS will be executed by the end of October.
- Metro Finance approved the release of the RFA for the 2nd round of funding in the amount of \$13,600,678.37.
- MDHA released the RFA on May 17, 2023.
- MDHA's Board approved 2 new awards at their October 10, 2023, meeting that will produce 10 AHGF units; 49 total affordable units.
- A total of 73 AHGF units;687 affordable units have been awarded to date.
- Applications for Round 2 of funding will be accepted until November 30, 2023, or funds are exhausted.

\$7 M Low Barrier Housing Collective and Competitive Grants RS 2022-1699 UPDATE: October 2023

\$3 Million Low Barrier Housing Collective (LBHC):

- 157 properties are participating in the collective.
- Landlords received incentives for housing 109 households experiencing homelessness.

\$4 Million Competitive Grants:

- RFP has been released
- The Application period closed on Friday, October 13th.
- Applications are under review and grant awards will be made by November 1st.



Housing Surge:

- 1. The next encampment has been announced: TA Camp
 - The TA Camp was closed on Friday, October 6th
 - 32 People moved into permanent or temporary housing with ongoing supportive services.
- 2. Permanent Housing and Housing Navigation Services
 - PHS, Voucher Subsidies, MDHA Properties, Private Owners
 - Increase Community Capacity with centralized housing navigation
 - Eliminating loss of resources (EHV, FUP, S+C)
 - Covid funds ended September 30th
- 3. Community Partner's Upcoming Priorities
 - Family Housing Challenge has begun
 - Chronic Housing Surge
 - Shelter Support
 - Encampment Housing Surge
