



**3,037 people** experienced homelessness in Nashville in **November 2023**. These 3,037 people were in **2,588 households**; **230 families** and **2,358 adult only households**. Over the past 12 months, **7,847 unique people** have experienced homelessness in Nashville. *A large part of the increase in November can be attributed to the opening of winter shelters*.




Number of people experiencing chronic homelessness over time






In November, **552** people experiencing homelessness were served in Emergency Shelters, **1,091** in Street Outreach, **206** in Transitional Housing, **526** in Supportive Services only, and **498** in Rapid Re-Housing who had not yet been housed.




In **November, 49%** of people experiencing homelessness were Black, **41%** were White, **3%** were Hispanic/Latino, **4%** were Multiracial, and **2%** were other.



*In family households, 69% of people are Black and 17% are White.* 



In **November**, **57%** of people experiencing homelessness were men, **42%** were women, **<1%** were non-binary, **1%** were transgender, and **<1%** were other.





**195 people** experiencing homelessness were housed in Nashville in **November 2023**. These 195 people were in **99 households**; **31 families** and **68 adult only households**. *Over the past 12 months*, **1,884 people** have been housed in Nashville.






Nashville housed 6% of the total people experiencing homelessness in November; 13% of the families and 3% of the adult only households.






**26 households** were housed with rapid re-housing subsidies in **November**, followed by **23 households** who were housed with no subsidy, and **12 households** who were housed with **VASH vouchers**.


In **November**, **24** people experiencing homelessness were housed from Emergency Shelters, **11** from Street Outreach, **36** from Transitional Housing, **17** from Supportive Services Only, and **95** from Rapid Re-Housing.





The top agencies who housed the most households in November were: **The Salvation Army (19), Operation Stand Down (18), Safe Haven Family Shelter (13), Oasis Center (9), and Room In The Inn (9).**
