Director's Update to the Board of Health April 2025

Protecting Health - Preventing the Spread of Infectious Disease

Measles

We were notified of a positive measles case within the state's Mid Cumberland Region (which includes us) on Friday, March 21. The next day we were notified of seven contacts identified within Davidson County. Since the exposure by that point was already more than 72 hours old, post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) was not recommended. When outside of the PEP window, our team notifies the contacts of exposure, educates on the disease and assesses immunity. If the contact is found to be immune, there is no further follow-up unless they become symptomatic. If the contact's immunity cannot be verified, they are asked to quarantine and will receive daily checks to assess for symptoms for 21-28 days. TDH managed the daily check-ins.

When a case is identified within our county, appropriate personnel are notified immediately, and we begin contact tracing. Once contacts are identified, we will offer PEP if it is within the appropriate timeframe. If we identify a contact that requires testing, we will arrange to meet them at their home or another open-air location (such as a parking lot) to obtain the specimen. In preparation, we have conducted a measles tabletop exercise and have identified personnel to activate, as needed. All key personnel have been fitted for appropriate PPE and we have clear flow charts to assist in navigating next steps.

Strike Team Numbers

This chart shows clinic totals at the MNPS Portables where we offer both physicals and vaccines. In total these clinics we have given 2,753 vaccines, conducted 240 physicals, and seen 1,068 students. This is the group we refer to as our Strike Team, one of the units whose funding was eliminated (a cut that was then put on hold) but whether that grant gets restored or not we have moved this groups' funding to the School Health budget. The main difference due to that funding stream change will be that we can serve only MNPS students, who to date have comprised about 80 percent of the clientele.

Organizational Updates

State of Metro - Council Budget hearing

The Mayor's State of Metro address is scheduled for May 1 at 10 a.m. in the main library downtown. He also releases his proposed budget that day.

The Metro Council has scheduled its budget hearings in the ensuing weeks. Ours is on the first day of the hearings, Monday, May 12, at 5 p.m. in the Council chambers in the Courthouse.

EHR

Our electronic health records system went live on Feb. 25. The vendor, Patagonia Health, went live with 115 users, including individuals from East Preventive Health, Lentz 120 Preventive Health, Woodbine Preventive Health, Sexual Health Center including DIS/EIS, Tuberculosis Elimination including Outreach, Pharmacy, Presumptive Eligibility, STRIKE, STD Outreach, EPI, and Women's Health Navigation.

Overall, implementation has been very successful, and staff have been excellent at anticipating needs and troubleshooting through initial issues. The EHR CORE team remains supportive of implementation needs, assisting individuals daily as issues arise. Next steps include initiating interfaces within the electronic health record including bidirectional TennIIS and lab interfaces including TDH state lab and AEL.

Finally, we look forward to onboarding additional locations/programs as additional funding becomes available, adding Behavioral Health, Occupational Health, and additional Population Health programs.

Grants cuts update

As you know, three of our grants were summarily stopped in late March, a few days prior to your retreat. We have scrambled to adopt to those cuts which were anticipated, but not for another year or so. This week a federal judge issued a temporary restraining order on those cuts. We will see what comes of that.

Lentz Renovations

Beginning on Monday all three Centennial rooms will be out of commission for renovations funded through the Public Health Infrastructure grant. The audio will be updated, and the video screens will go to single big screens instead of the four smaller ones abutting one another, and well as some other updates. Once that is finished the Board room will be closed for similar updates for a week or two, depending. The work is expected to take about two months all told.

MACC

The animal control shelter has gotten an emergency generator. This is great news for the animals who will no longer have to soldier through cold winter nights or hot summer days with no heat or air conditioning, as well as for our stock of vaccine supplies and the people who have frequently had to go out there and unload them for a trip to Lentz until the power came back on, when they could be returned to the shelter.

And in more good animal news, our new veterinarian is scheduled to come on board in 11 days (but who's counting). We very much look forward to having Dr. Hope Hunter on staff. We continue our search for a section veterinarian.

New to Public Health

During the last year six of our staff members _ three from the Clinical Services Bureau and one each from Behavioral Health and Wellness; Immunizations; and Oral Health _ completed the year-long New to Public Health residency program, sponsored through the PHIG grant. This program allowed individuals early in their public health careers to participate in monthly activities around public health competence and foundational capacities.

In addition, each of the staff designed and implemented (or is in the process of implementing) their own evidence-based practice project.

Music City Behavioral Health and Wellness Summit

The summit will be April 14 (next Monday) with featured speakers Jelly Roll, a Nashville native and musician, and the keynote speaker, Dr. Karhlton Moore, the former director of the Bureau of Justice Assistance. The summit will allow local leaders and stakeholders a chance to discuss topics such as fostering resilience, building safety and empowering wellness in our communities.

The summit will be a full day of information and messages around mental health, behavioral health and community violence. Dr. Moore's keynote will begin the day, followed by panel discussions with local and national behavioral health experts. A panel featuring youth leaders will precede a discussion with Jason DeFord, known professionally as Jelly Roll.

There is no cost to register. As of this morning we had 640 people registered.

Continuing Education

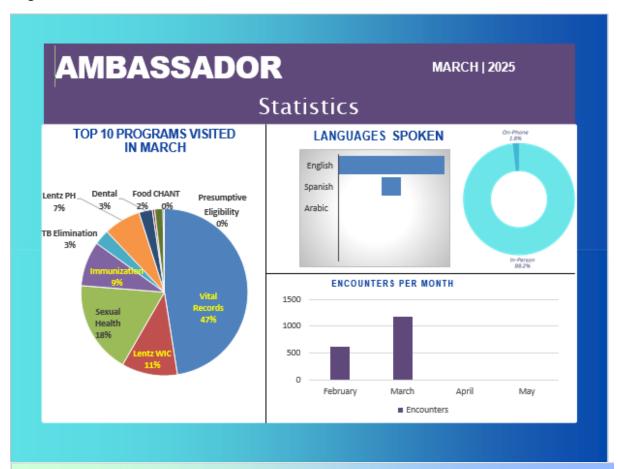
