Overview

Choose How You Move (CHYM) is Nashville and Davidson County's 2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), funded by a voter-approved 0.5 cent dedicated sales tax and federal, state, and local funds. CHYM includes upgrades to almost 600 signalized intersections to replace current traffic lights with those that use technology to watch traffic, learn its flow, and adapt based on demand. It adds 24/7/365 transit service, four new express routes, increases in frequent, crosstown, connector, and local service routes, a low-income fare program, 12 new transit centers, 17 new Park & Rides, 285 bus stop enhancements, and 54 miles of All-Access Corridors with more frequent, reliable, and accessible transit service. It builds 86 miles of sidewalks and walkable paths to ensure Nashville completes our most urgent sidewalk needs and connects our busiest neighborhoods to major transit routes. The program makes safety improvements on 78 miles of the Vision Zero High-Injury Network, creating safer streets for pedestrians, bicyclists, drivers, and transit users alike.

CHYM is led by a program management team in the Mayor's Office that oversees the program across multiple implementing and supporting departments, including but not limited to WeGo, Nashville Department of Transportation and Multimodal Infrastructure, Information Technology Services, Planning, Department of Law, and Metro Nashville Police Department. This centralized program management structure ensures coordinated, collaborative, efficient, and transparent delivery of the program across numerous project owners and contributors.
