#### Born in Slavery: Slave Narratives from the Federal Writers' Project, 1936-1938

African American accounts of occupied Nashville are rare. During the 1930s, the Works Progress Administration, a Federal New Deal initiative, conducted oral interviews of former slaves. This online collection, hosted by the Library of Congress, consists of the original interviews assembled, transcribed and microfilmed in 1941 as the seventeen-volume *Slave Narratives: A Folk History of Slavery in the United States from Interviews with Former Slaves*. The collection also includes more than 200 photographs from the Prints and Photographs Division. After accessing this site, search "Nashville" to find local accounts. #### The Freedmen's Bureau Online

A large number of slave and free African Americans fled to Nashville during the Union occupation. The Union Army impressed many to build fortifications around the city and some eventually served in United States Colored Troop regiments. The Freedmen's Bureau, created by the U.S. government in 1865, documented many of the challenges they faced following the war. The War of the Rebellion: A Compilation of the Official Records of the Union and Confederate Armies In 1863, Union General-in-Chief Henry Wager Halleck recommended to the Committee on Military Affairs the collection and publication of official documents and reports on all Civil War operations. On May 20, 1864,





President Abraham Lincoln signed a bill into law "to provide for the printing of the official reports of the armies of the United States." The Official Records were compiled in 127 volumes, plus a *General Index* and accompanying *Atlas*.
