CHYM Investment Priorities

This \$100 million investment allows Choose How You Move to keep building current projects and start new ones across all four voter-approved priorities: sidewalks, signals, service, and safety. It also means more improvements will move from planning into construction.



Sidewalks

\$16.8M

Moving 17 new quick-build sidewalk projects across 15 council districts into planning and design to close gaps in the pedestrian network, connect residents to major transit routes, and provide safe, easy connections accessible to all users.



Transit Service

\$29.8M

Transit Centers **\$25.3M**

Planning and building transit centers, including construction of the Donelson Transit Center and site selection and project development for future locations, to expand connectivity, improve reliability, and support future service growth.

Bus Operations and Maintenance **\$3.7M**

Installation of new maintenance bays and lift, bus wash, and lighting and electrical upgrades at existing WeGo facilities, including the Nestor Street operations and maintenance facility, to improve bus operations.

Bus Fleet Expansion **\$750K**

Expansion and modernization of WeGo's bus fleet to support continued CHYM service improvements. This investment includes the purchase of 3 new vehicles to better meet the needs of WeGo Access riders.



Safety

\$22.4M

Complete Streets

Planning, design, and construction of Complete Streets to improve safety and connectivity for all users. Investments include full construction of the Edgehill Avenue, design of four additional Complete Streets projects across 8 miles (East Thompson Lane, County Hospital Road, Jefferson Street, and Lebanon Pike), and engineering and survey work initiated on nearly 34 miles of future Complete Street projects.



Signals

\$19M

Corridor Upgrades **\$7.9M**

Installation of 99 new smart traffic signals across Gallatin Pike (56), Wedgewood Avenue (6), Edgehill Avenue (5), and Hillsboro Pike (32) to improve safety, reduce delays, and support reliable travel.

Advanced Traffic Management System (ATMS) **\$2M**

A centralized ATMS using real-time data, connected signals, cameras, and dynamic messaging to improve traffic operations, incident response, and signal timing, including bike and pedestrian recognition and transit signal priority. Activating along Nolensville Pike, Harding Place, Downtown, Murfreesboro Pike, and Lebanon Pike.

Fiber Communications Network **\$4.5M**

Future fiber optic cable will connect signals in real time and enable future smart mobility technology. New network hardware is now live at 73 CHYM intersections, over 12% of the program's total.

Signal Network **\$3.0M**

Long-lead hardware procurement to accelerate future signal construction and modernization citywide.



All-Access Corridors

\$7.7M

Planning, engineering, and project development for Nashville's busiest roadways, creating walkable communities, connected to high-quality transit.

Funding advances the Nolensville Pike AAC through planning, engineering, and community engagement, and continues corridor design for the Main Street/Gallatin Pike AAC. It also launches a Transit-Oriented Development Study, a program-wide framework for how Nashville grows around high-quality transit.

SIGNALS

Advancing Traffic Signal Operations

Through Advanced Traffic Management System software, CHYM will be transitioning all signals to a new system to provide better connectivity and visibility of operations, allow for more timely maintenance and troubleshooting, and upgrade the security of the signal equipment that is currently in place.

Main Street and Gallatin Pike Signal Upgrades

Targeted traffic signal upgrades along Gallatin Pike to improve safety, reduce delays and support more reliable travel through one of Nashville's busiest corridors.

Fiber Expansion: Gallatin Pike

New network hardware at 73 intersections across Nashville to power countywide traffic signal network upgrades.



SERVICE

WeGo Service Improvements

- **Route 34** – Opry Mills: weekday frequency improvements: from hourly to every 30 to 40 minutes.
- **Route 79** – Skyline: adding service to improve reliability, extending service to 10 p.m.
- **Route 4** – Shelby: expanded service hours on Sundays from 5:15 a.m. to 1:15 a.m.
- **Route 56** – Gallatin Pike: expanded service hours on Sundays from 5:15 a.m. to 1:15 a.m. on Sundays.

Journey Pass Expansion

Expanding eligibility for the Journey Pass program so more Davidson County residents can use fare-free transit.

New Buses and WeGo Access Expansion

Twenty-one of 65 planned buses have been purchased to enhance service for WeGo Access customers, including three new WeGo Access vehicles from this investment announcement.

WeGo Facility Improvements

Nestor garage bay installation, bus wash facility upgrades, electrical upgrades and other capital investments in existing WeGo facilities.

SAFETY

Transit Security Upgrades

As WeGo expands toward 24/7 service, a dedicated unit will support a layered safety approach that includes outreach programs, private security personnel, and sworn MNP officers working together to address emergencies, enforce conduct standards, and help riders feel safe on transit.

ALL-ACCESS CORRIDORS (AACs)

Main Street and Gallatin Pike AAC

Planning and project development for the Gallatin Pike All-Access Corridor from South 5th Street to Briley Parkway.
